Dear Parents,

We are building momentum each and every day with good routines and high expectations for all of our students. Last week the Premier announced a loosening of some of the COVID restrictions for the people of Victoria. Restaurants, employees returning to their workplace, use of QR codes and moving from a "COVID Normal" to a "COVID Confident" mentality.

However primary schools in particular have been directed to strictly continue with COVID Safe practices until the end of Term 1 2022. This will include the twice weekly RAT testing (Monday & Wednesday), mandatory wearing of facemasks in Year 3 - 6 and regular hand sanitizing and social distancing including playing in 'bubbles'. Statistics from the weekend show that 22% of current positive COVID cases are from the 0 to 9 age group and another 20% of the cases are from the 10 to 18 age group. Thus almost half (42%) of cases at present are coming out of primary and secondary schools each day. At SFX we have averaged 1 to 2 positive cases per day. We notify parents through the school Updat-Ed app. Thank you to the parents who have been so vigilant and meticulous with using their Government supplied RAT tests. We are expecting another delivery of these in the coming week and these will be distributed to all students each fortnight for the remainder of the term.

If your RAT is positive please phone the school on 9435 8474 as a matter of first priority to seek further directions. We have had even within our own school 'False Positives' and 'False Negatives' and the only way to confirm this is by PCR test. Let's keep using the COVID Safe practices that have kept our SFX COVID numbers well below the current averages, working together to get notifications out to parents quickly, keeping our children at home when they are feeling not-quiteright, keeping our teachers healthy so that classrooms stay open. It's a team effort and together we will get through this.



2022 SCHOOL MUSICAL "ROCK BOTTOM"

After having practised and rehearsed....after making many of our costumes and props....after we worked so hard with our dances....only to have our performance postponed three times in 2021, we promised to show the school value of 'resilience' and keep bouncing back. Gone are the DVD sales that used to happen after the performance...like everything in 2022 the video can be downloaded from a secure online SFX portal. Families are then not paying \$25 for a DVD. It is now included in your ticket cost for all families to play whenever/ wherever they want.

3 Children - \$1560 per annum

- Any family holding a Health Care Card and eligible for CSEF.
- Any family experiencing severe financial hardship.
- Any family holding a DVA Gold Card.
- Any family identified as refugees and holding an ImmiCard.
- Any student who attends a MACS primary school on a part time basis, who meet any of the criteria detailed above.

Collection Notice for parents/guardians

2022 Student Residential Address and Other Information

The Australian Government Department of Education, Skills and Employment (the department) would like to notify you that a request has been made for your child's school to provide residential address and other information as required under the *Australian Education Regulation 2013*.

The school is required to provide the department with the following information about each student at the school:

- Names and residential addresses of student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- Student residential address (excluding student names)
- Whether the student is a primary or secondary student (education level)
- Whether the student is boarding or a day student (boarding status).

The school collects the above information by generating a **unique and unidentifiable** – student reference number (SRN) for each student record. The SRN is also **only** used by the school for this collection. **It is not allowed to be used for any other purpose**. The number only indicates to the department that each record provided is for one student.

Purpose of the collection

The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (the Collection) informs Australian Government school education policy and helps ensure funding for non-government schools is based on need basis.

The information collected will be used to inform school funding calculations. It is combined with data held by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) to calculate a non-government school community's anticipated capacity to contribute to the costs of schooling.

From 2020, a new measure of capacity to contribute, the Direct Measure of Income (DMI), was introduced. The DMI is based on the median income of parents or guardians of students at a non-government school using data collected through the Collection. More information about the DMI can be found on the <u>Quality Schools</u> <u>Package</u> page on the departmental website.

Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law under the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) (Privacy Act). Personal information is information or an opinion about an identifiable individual. Personal information includes an individual's name and contact details.

Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with Privacy Act and the *Australian Education Act 2013* and *Australian Education Regulation 2013*.

Your personal information provided to the department through the Collection may be:

- disclosed to the ABS for the purposes of capacity to contribute calculations and analysis as a part of the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP). Further information about MADIP can be found on the <u>MADIP page</u> on the ABS website.
- disclosed to a contracted auditor where the department may from time to time, carry out an audit of
 a school's submission to the Collection. The contracted auditor compares the school's submission with
 the student enrolment information held by the school and will not use the information for any other
 purpose.
- disclosed to its service providers for the purposes of the provision of information and communications technology support services to the department.
- used or disclosed where it is otherwise required or authorised by law.

The department does not intend to disclose your personal information to any overseas recipients.

The department's privacy policy can be found at <u>www.dese.gov.au</u> and includes information on:

- how individuals can access and seek correction of the personal information held by the department;
- how complaints about potential breaches or breaches of the Privacy Act can be made;
- how the department will deal with these complaints.

The department commissioned an independent privacy impact assessment (PIA). The PIA assesses the flows of information under the Collection, compliance with the Privacy Act and measures in place to safeguard the personal information being collected. What do you need to do?

You are not required to do anything. Your school is responsible for providing the requested details to the department; however, you may wish to ensure that your school has the most up-to-date and correct details for your family.

Welcome to Term 1, 2022! Hopefully this year will have no interruptions and we'll get some great learning! To start off the term in Digital Technologies, we will be having a big focus on Cyber safety. With the amount of time kids (and adults) spend on technology these days, learning to use the technology safely is very important.

The Prep and Year One students will be learning how to use a desktop PC and its components, the mouse and keyboard. These skills and others will be taught with the help of <u>GCompris</u>, an excellent open source application that is available on most platforms. They will also learn to log on, the proper way to shut down a PC and what the various common icons mean (files, open and close etc)



The Year Two students will learn about the potential dangers in the online world and what basic steps we all need to take in order to have positive digital experiences. They will learn why it is important to name their creative work, understand how to use a search engine safely to find pictures, use SMART rules and look at what information should be kept safe when using the Internet. The lessons then explore the positives and potential negatives of online communication, such as email, and develop the skills to recognise potential dangers and act accordingly to keep themselves and others safe.



In Year Three and Four, the students are introduced to email and other forms of online communication. They will look at how to write and send emails, as well as how to decide if an email is safe to open. They will build on their existing knowledge of cyberbullying and how to deal with unkind behavior online. The importance of privacy settings is introduced and children will discuss the types of information we should not share online. They will build on the idea of a digital footprint by thinking about how the adverts they see online are targeted at them.

In Year Five and Six, the students will focus on online safety, they will be taking a more in depth look at a variety of online safety issues, most of which they will have been familiarized with in previous years. They will be introduced to the idea of the internet, as a type of media, and how it can shape our ideas about boys and girls through stereotypes. Children will be given ways to deal with online content that they find worrying or even believe to be dangerous.

Shrove Tuesday Fact Sheet

- Shrove Tuesday is the day before Lent starts and the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday.
- It's a day to say a sorry prayer to God before Lent. It is also a day of celebration as the last chance to feast before Lent begins.
- Shrove Tuesday is sometimes called Pancake Day after the fried batter recipe traditionally eaten on this day.
- So that no food was wasted, families would have a feast on the Shrove Tuesday, and eat up all the foods that woudn't last the forty days of Lent without going off.
- Pancakes became associated with Shrove Tuesday as they were a dish that could use up all the eggs, fats and milk in the house with just the addition of flour.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup self-raising flour ¼ cup caster sugar 2 eggs
- 1 cup milk

INSTRUCTIONS

- Sift flour and sugar into medium bowl, gradually whisk in combined eggs and milk until batter is smooth.
- Pour ¼ cup batter into heated, greased frying pan.
 Cook pancake until bubbles begin to appear on surface. Turn pancake, cook until browned lightly.
 Cover to keep warm. Repeat with remaining batter.
- We love our pancakes with lemon and sugar, but fresh berries, maple syrup or jam are great alternative topping ideas.

MADE BY AMY O'KEEFE (MUM TO SOL)

INSTRUCTIONS

- Sift dry ingredients together. Form well in the centre and add egg yolks, milk and vanilla. Mix thoroughly.
- In a separate bowl, whisk white until stiff peaks form. Gently fold flour mixture into egg whites until just combined.
- Bring frying pan to medium heat, spray with oil and pour a soup ladle of mixture into the pan.
 When bubbles form and burst, turn over and brown on second side.
- Variations: Sliced or mashed bananas, blueberries or strawberries can all be added for variety.

INGREDIENTS

1½ cups white spelt flour you can use all-purpose flour if you wish
1½ Tablespoons baking powder
½ cups non-dairy milk
3 Tablespoons organic cane sugar
3 Tablespoons organic canola oil or coconut oil, or melted vegan buttery

½ teaspoon salt

INSTRUCTIONS

- Mix dry ingredients in a large bowl.
- Add wet ingredients, and let rise for about five minutes.
- Melt a tablespoon of vegan buttery spread in a large frying pan over medium heat.
- Spoon the batter into the pan, and cook until you see the edges starting to turn golden brown.
- Flip pancakes and continue to cook until done, about 3 more minutes.
- Serve with vegan buttery spread and syrup, or desired fruit topping.

TIPS

- The secret ingredient is baking powder. The baking powder causes the pancake batter to rise and produces perfectly fluffy and tender vegan pancakes.
- If you want to try to make these pancakes oil-free, try using applesauce instead of oil. The texture may not be quite as fluffy, but the recipe will still work.
- Let the batter rise for at least 5 minutes. The baking powder needs a few minutes to do its job.
- Don't over-mix the batter. It doesn't need to be super smooth.
- Don't turn the heat too high! Medium heat will do it.
- Don't flip them too quickly. It will take about 5 minutes for the bottom to cook through. Look for the edges to be cooked, and a few bubbles to form in the batter. Then flip and finish cooking.
- You can use canola oil, melted coconut oil, or melted vegan buttery spread. Any neutral tasting oil should work well.
- Use the non-dairy milk that works for your dietary needs. You can even use water.



Parish Child Safety News

The conversations we have to have.

As we are about to begin our Lenten Journey it seems a good time to continue the ongoing conversation about Child Safety and how best to protect our children, young people and the vulnerable. Through this ongoing conversation we create a nurturing environment where children are respected, where their voices are heard, where they feel safe and are safe.

We have a need to empower children and young people in our parishes and to create a safer future for them. The Royal Commission and recent studies have taught us that when children are; engaged, valued, informed and able to participate positively in parish life, this contributes to a child having a sense of safety and an awareness of child safety. This approach in turn is a contributing factor in helping prevent abuse. Once the conversation is engaged in, we begin to make changes.

During some of the Sundays of Lent this year we are proposing to focus our attention on a few 2–3 minute video clips of an interview by Geraldine Doogue with Robert Fitzgerald, former Commissioner of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.

These brief videos clips discuss numerous aspects of child safety, including:

- The need to begin the conversation of child safety with children and their families.
- The need for a conversation that naturally takes place within parishes. (An open conversation.)
- A reminder that Child abuse thrives on an environment of secrecy.
- The importance of Safeguards in establishing a child safe environment, and
- The impact of Abuse.
